Objectives:	Students will identify the elements of line and color. Students will create a work of art based on knowledge of the Huichol Indian culture.

Procedure:

- 1. **Introduction:** Using the PPT Presentation, introduce students to the Huichol culture. Show examples of yarn paintings. Discuss use of lines/outlines and contrasting colors.
- 2. **Procedures and Demonstration:** Explain that students will create their own Huichol symbol. Demonstrate how to make a border. Allow students to practice on a rough draft before drawing their final design on tagboard. Demonstrate how to glue yarn: outline first, then fill in area. Apply glue, then , using a toothpick, press yarn to area. Cover entire piece with yarn.
- 3. **Closure:** Students will discuss their symbol and explain how their artwork is "Huichol".
